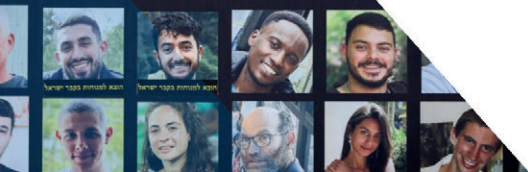

Mission

The *Forward* is the most significant Jewish voice in American journalism. Our outstanding reporting on cultural, social and political issues inspires readers of all ages and animates conversation across generations and different segments of our community. Our English and Yiddish platforms build on a century-old legacy maintained in our archives and lead to a deeper understanding of what it means to be Jewish in the 21st century.

Vision

The *Forward* envisions a vibrant, connected global Jewish community informed by our shared history and committed to justice, compassion, truth and our collective responsibility to bridge our divides.

Values

INTEGRITY We provide fair and full reporting in the highest tradition of public-service journalism, a cornerstone of resilient democracy. Through our work, we help build the foundation for a just, open, pluralistic society.

COURAGE We pursue the truth wherever it takes us, delivering the news, investigations, narrative storytelling and commentary that our community needs and deserves.

INDEPENDENCE As a nonprofit supported by our readers and a broad array of philanthropies, we are not beholden to any individual, institution or ideology. YIDDISHKEIT We revel in the richness of our culture and history, providing a smorgasbord of art and politics, argument and understanding. We also share our rich Yiddish heritage, promoting it as a living treasure for future generations. Sharing stories, in English and Yiddish, of the diverse ways Jews of all backgrounds – and our neighbors – live and think and celebrate and mourn enhances our human connections. Ours is a particularly Jewish-American way of looking at the world: contrarian, cosmopolitan, fiercely intelligent and wickedly funny.

Our First Full Year of Membership

In December 2023 – and for the first time in our 126-year history – the *Forward* removed its paywall, making our journalism free and available to everyone, everywhere. Removing the barriers to access was accompanied by a transition to a member-supported business model, inviting readers to support the journalism they value. The first full year of membership generated substantial audience growth and membership revenue.



Our traffic increases brought in new readers, a meaningful number of whom converted to membership. A substantial number of former subscribers not only renewed their support but were motivated to give above the amount they were formerly paying for a subscription.

The success of the membership model is based on the value that the *Forward* provides to its readers. Our 2024 audience survey confirmed that in addition to providing trusted information, the *Forward's* journalism also has an emotional value. It creates confidence and connection, as well as satisfying readers' curiosity and sense of belonging. While the *Forward* reports on challenges facing American Jews, such as antisemitism, our readers are substantially less anxious than they are informed and confident.

Awards and Recognition

The *Forward* again competed against some of the most widely read and respected publications to win prestigious awards and recognition from the American Jewish Press Association, Religion News Association, the New York Press Club and the Los Angeles Press Club.

The *Forward* won **12 awards from the Religion News Association, including the top award for “Religion Story of the Year”** for our [Special Report: What's it really like to be Jewish on campus now](#).

We won **33 Simon Rockower Awards for Excellence in Jewish Journalism** [the “Jewish Pulitzers”) from the American Jewish Press Association – the most of any Jewish media organization. The awards included 19 first place awards, including contributor Lev Golinkin’s extensive reporting on the crisis in the Canadian Parliament following the recognition of a former Nazi soldier; contributor Andrew Silverstein’s moving story on the *Forward*’s Seeking Relatives column, which saved lives, reunited families and changed the course of Jewish history.

Finally, the *Forward* was honored by the **Institute for Nonprofit News**, the network of more than 475 independent news organizations, with the 2024 INNovator Award recognizing the success of our paywall removal.

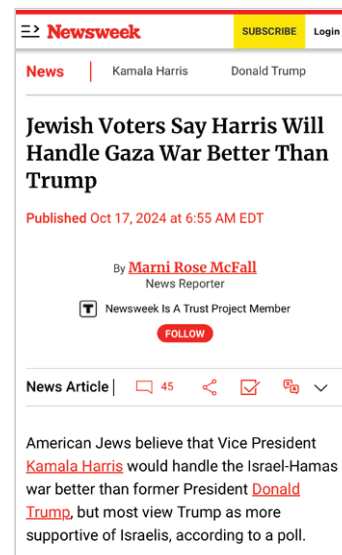

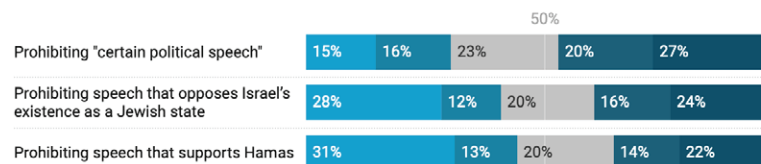

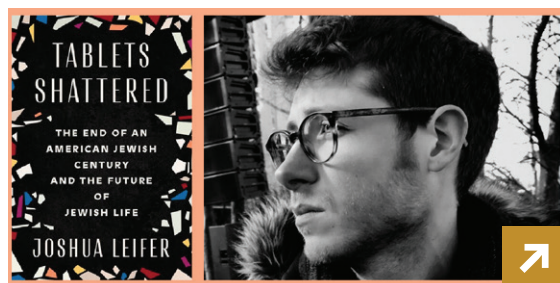

Jewish deli and Yiddish cooking in a TikTok world

Within the past decade, many young Jewish chefs have discovered the hearty home cooking that Jews in prewar Eastern Europe used to prepare for their families.

In the old days, Jewish home cooks – mostly women – taught their daughters these recipes as they stood together by the stove. With the mass Jewish immigration to the United States at the turn of the 20th century, mothers began writing the recipes down for their families. Eventually this led to a significant Jewish cookbook industry.

Today many young people are creating and sharing short cooking videos through social media channels like TikTok. For Jews from non-traditional or non-religious backgrounds this has become a fun way to engage with their Jewish identity. We explored TikTok's potential in sharing Yiddish cooking with people around the globe, with renowned chefs Jeffrey Yoskowitz [Gefilteria], Shannon Sarna [The Noshers], Jeremy Umansky [Larder: A Curated Delicatessen & Bakery] and food and travel writer Joe Baur. How young cantors are embracing the sound of the traditional synagogue

Superstar cantors could once be heard from the synagogue to Carnegie Hall. 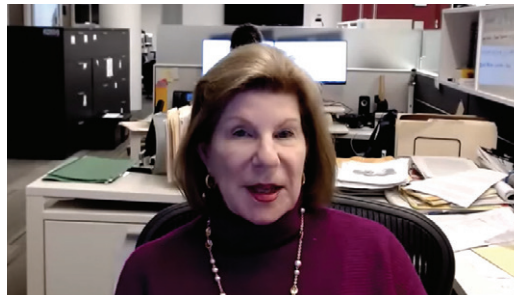
